Mrs. Mary K. Neil visited her father, Lonnie May, at the Dry Ridge Rest Home, Sunday. He is some better.

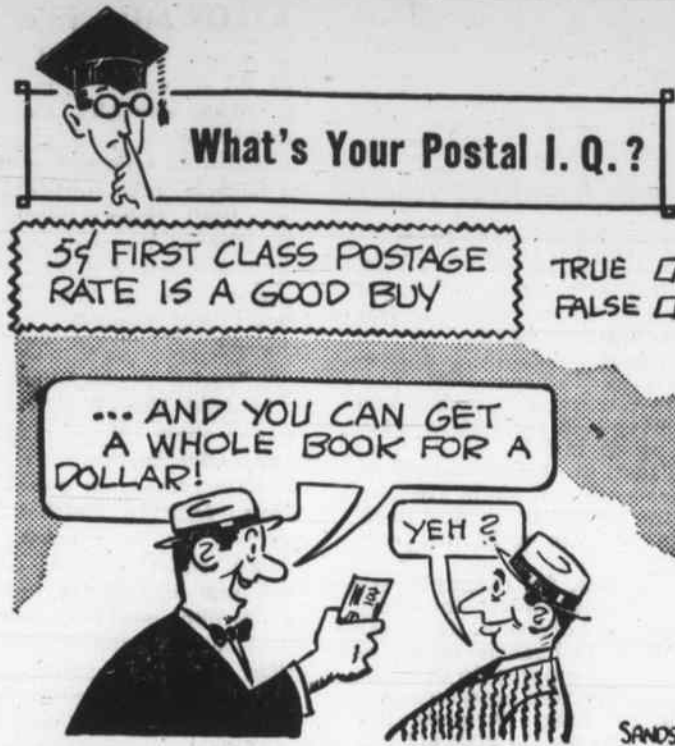
**WHITES TOWER**

**ORDINANCE NO. 1963-13**

An Ordinance annexing certain lands contiguous to the present Northwesterly City Limits and certain lands contiguous to the present Southerly City Limits of the City of Walton, Kentucky, under provisions of Chapter 81 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Walton, Kentucky, has ordained that certain territory hereinafter set out be annexed to the City of Walton, Boone County, Kentucky, and the publication of said ordinance having been made as provided by law and no contravening petition having been filed;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF WALTON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

That the territory included in the following descriptions be annexed to the City of Walton, Kentucky:

Lying and being in Boone County, Kentucky, adjacent to and contiguous with the northwesterly city limits of the City of Walton, Kentucky, and more particularly described as follows: Beginning at a point in the present city limits, said point being the intersection of the Beaver Grade Road and with the east right of way line of I-75; thence with the present city limits north 230 feet; thence continuing with the east right of way line of I-75 north 1150 feet, more or less, to a point in the present city limits; thence with the present city limits for three calls southeast 1640 feet, more or less, to the corner of Dance and Ryan; thence southeast 200 feet to a point in Beaver Grade Road; thence with said road westerly 1050 feet, more or less, to the beginning.

Another tract lying and being in Boone County, Kentucky, adjacent to and contiguous with the southerly city limits of the City of Walton, Kentucky, and more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the center of Stephenson Mill Road, the northwest corner of the Walton-Verona School property; thence with said school property for two calls south 760 feet, more or less, to the southwest corner of the school property; thence easterly 720 feet, more or less, to the westerly right of way line of School road; thence with said right of way south 1020 feet, more or less, to the present city limits which is the northerly right of way line of Kentucky Highway 16; thence with said city limits in a southwesterly direction 1850 feet, more or less, to the right of way line of I-75; thence with present city limits for five calls north 200 feet; northeast 700 feet; northwest 1050 feet; north 225 feet to Stephenson Mill Road; thence with Stephenson Mill Road northeast 1000 feet, more or less, to the beginning.

That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from its passage and publication as by law required.

PASSED AND APPROVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WALTON, KENTUCKY, by a vote of 4 members of the Council on the 18th day of April, 1963.

**ORDINANCE NO. 1963-14**

An Ordinance ordering the improvement of Bedinger Avenue in the City of Walton, Kentucky, by reconstructing and resurfacing said street with a bituminous asphalt surface, from existing paving on U. S. Highway 25 N 72 West 370 feet, more or less; thence N 78 W 75 feet; thence N 85 - 45 W 438 feet to the end of Dedicated Right of Way, and providing that the entire costs thereof be apportioned and assessed pro rata against the owners of the property fronting and abutting on such improvement, as provided by Chapter 94 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes and providing that the payment by the property owners for said improvement be made in cash within 30 days after the acceptance of such improvement and the passage of an assessment ordinance as provided by Chapter 94 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.

WHEREAS, a resolution has been adopted by the City Council of the City of Walton, Kentucky, for the improvement of BEDINGER AVENUE in said City as law requires.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WALTON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That it hereby orders and requires the improvement of BEDINGER AVENUE by reconstructing and resurfacing said street with a Bituminous Asphalt surface from the existing paving on U. S. Highway 25 N 72 W 370 feet, more or less; thence N 78 W 75 feet; thence N 85 - 45 W 438 feet to the end of the dedicated right of way.

Section 2. Said work shall be done in accordance with the specifications prepared by James Ransom, City Engineer, Walton, Kentucky, all of which specifications are hereby adopted as the specifications for the improvement herein ordered and are hereby declared to be a part of this ordinance as though fully set forth herein; and said improvement shall be made in accordance with plans and estimates as filed with the City Council of the City of Walton, Kentucky, by James Ransom, City Engineer for Walton, Kentucky.

Section 3. The City Council of the City of Walton, Kentucky, hereby declares this improvement to be a necessity and the materials provided in said specification suitable therefor and the City Clerk is ordered to advertise for sealed proposals for the doing of said work, and the furnishing of the materials therefor, by the insertion of an advertisement in a newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Walton, Kentucky, at least once a week for at least two weeks before the letting of the contract for doing said work. Said bids shall be accompanied by a certified check or bank draft in the amount of Five (5%) Percent of the bid and are to be read and opened before the City Council of the City of Walton, Kentucky, at its regular meeting, and the said council reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

The contractor whose bid is accepted shall enter into a written contract with the City of Walton, Kentucky, and execute bond in the sum of Fifty (50%) Percent of the bid conditioned on the faithful performance of said contract and shall complete said work in (60) sixty working days from the time said bid is accepted and contract entered into by said City Council; however, provided, that said time may be extended for a reasonable period in the discretion of the City Council, if the contractor is prevented from completing said work within said time without any fault on his part. All of said work is to be done under the direction of the City Council and the City Engineer of Walton, Kentucky. The City Engineer of the City of Walton shall be the referee in all decisions pertaining to the improvement herein ordered and his decision shall be final wherever the compliance with plans, estimates and specifications is involved, but the City Council may reject said work if it is not done in a workmanlike manner to their satisfaction.

The City Engineer of the City of Walton is hereby required to report to the City Council when said improvement is ready for acceptance, said report to contain an itemized statement for the entire costs of the improvement and the total length of the improvement in lineal feet. The entire costs of said work shall be done at the costs and expense of the owners of lots or parts of lots, or land, abutting and fronting thereon, and when completed the entire costs and expenses of this improvement shall be ascertained, and shall be apportioned, levied and assessed upon and against the lots or parts of lots or land fronting or abutting thereon, as provided by Chapter 94 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes. A lien prior and superior to all other liens is hereby created on all lots, or parts of lots, or land fronting and abutting thereon, to secure the payment of said Assessments, payment of which is to be made in cash within (30) days after the adoption of the apportionment ordinance thereof.

Any assessments or parts of assessments not paid within (30) Thirty days after the adoption of the apportionment ordinance thereof, shall bear interest at the rate of (6%) Six percent per annum from date of the adoption of the apportionment ordinance, as provided in Chapter 94 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.

Section 4. The improvement provided for by this Ordinance shall be known and designated as a stage improvement.

Section 5. Other stage improvements which will be required before the said improvement will be completed are the construction of a sewer system, sidewalks, and such other improvements as the City Council of the City of Walton, Kentucky, may later deem necessary.

Section 6. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage and publication as provided by Chapter 94 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.
