

BOONE COUNTY FISCAL COURT

Commissioner Davis confirmed with the court that this building had been designed with only one handrail and said that since this was the case, the architect should be responsible for the change, not the county.

County Attorney Larry Crigler confirmed that this was the case and said that there may be some responsibility to be taken up with the architect. The court concurred that the work should proceed to ensure that there is no difficulty with the occupancy permit, and that Robert Martin will report on this issue at the next meeting.

SEASON PASS - GOLF COURSE

R. Scott Kimmich questioned the court regarding a request that has been received that the county allow persons purchasing a season pass to the Boone Links Golf Course to transfer that pass if they move out of the area, and also advised the court that there had been a question raised regarding the willingness of the county to allow the Northern Kentucky Women's Golf League three days of free play in contrast to the one day that has been generally permitted to occur. The court members agreed that they would not get into the position of allowing the transferring of the passes, and that one day of golf for the Northern Kentucky Women's Golf League will be continued.

ITEM IX.

NEW BUSINESS

ROAD CLOSING - ERLANGER ROAD

Judge Ferguson requested that the court honor the request of Corporex to allow for the closing of a portion of Erlanger Road. Commissioner Robinson moved that the court proceed with the normal closing procedure and advertise for the public hearing regarding same. Commissioner Raverty seconded the motion and Judge Ferguson called for the vote on the motion, and ALL VOTED AYE.

MAIN STREET & KENTUCKY 18

Commissioner Raverty stated that he had talked with Joe Kearnes on this date and that the state was attempting to find the funds for the removal of the knob in the road near Main Street in Burlington. Judge Ferguson advised that he had received a contract from the Kentucky Department of Highways advising that the contract was available and that the state would pay up to \$125,000 for the engineering and construction for the project. County Attorney Larry Crigler advised the court that in reading the contract he was not certain that this was the case, and that the state may not pay for anything other than the engineering,
